Did You Know?

- 1. That the ginkgo tree (Ginkgo biloba) is among the most ancient of plants still in existence? Considered a living fossil, it's said to have survived, unchanged, for more than 200 million years. It's also a lonely specimen, being the only one of its species, with no known living relatives. With its roots in China, the ginkgo (or maidenhair tree) has made its way around the world to become a popular landscape tree, despite the fact that the female produces foul-smelling fruit (best to spec a male, if you want to maintain good neighbour relations).
- 2. **Butterflies might be more attracted to your weeds than your flowers.** Colorful blooms aren't the chief reason these insects love your garden it's more about the fragrance and nectar. According to the Smithsonian Institute, new cultivars of popular flowers have been bred for enhanced color and size, but have often lost their fragrance in the process. So everyday weeds, like dandelions and clovers, might actually be the most appealing things in your yard to butterflies (they hate pesticides, too).
- 3. That gardening is good for your mental health? The hobby can do wonders for our emotional wellbeing as well. Here's how:
- Watching something you planted come to life and bloom can create a wonderful sense of accomplishment and help boost your self-esteem. (even if your first carrot costs you \$25! mjp)
- Gardening is a good way to interact with others socially as you can network with other gardeners, sharing your successes and tips or even maintain a plot at a community garden. (and hort society events... mjp)
- Gardening is also a great way to be more conscientious of what you're eating. When you garden, you're responsible for taking care of living things and watching them grow. You have to pay attention to the weather and be sure to properly nourish your garden. In a way, being acutely aware of these natural truths can help us be aware of how we feed and take care of ourselves (and others!).
