This Month in the Garden – March

Peterborough & Area Master Gardeners

Visit your local greenhouse.

Order summer-flowering bulbs.

Prune summer-flowering shrubs (e.g. Hydrangea)

Plant flower and vegetable seeds indoors.

Prune grapevines.

Start summer flowers and tender perennials (tuberous begonias, cannas, callas and caladiums in pots).

Loosen packed mulch and press back frost heaved perennials.

Cut some spring flowering shrub branches for forcing inside.
