Successful Spring Plant Sale!

It was a rainy, wet day for our annual Spring Plant Sale on Saturday, May 9th. We were fortunate that the rain held off while we set up and for the first hour when most of our plants are quickly sold. Despite a light rain, buying continued, but when it started to pour and thunder, we scrambled to put everything away. Many thanks to our great volunteers, especially those who worked to the end despite being thoroughly soaked through! Thanks also to those who brought in plants - our tables were filled to brimming! Our volunteers did a huge job quickly and efficiently. We made \$968.05 in profit before our early rainout! Congratulations and thanks to all involved.

Fleming Park

Thanks to our volunteers, the Spring Cleanup is done at Fleming Park. The surfaces of the paths through the garden beds have been topped up with limestone screenings and the edging of the exterior beds will be done in the near future. Now the summer work is about to begin and we will need help with the maintenance. The work crew will be meeting at the Park (at the corner of Brock and Aylmer – just north of the library) on Wednesdays from 10 to about noon. If you can spare a couple of hours at any point during the season, please come out and give us a hand. Bring your gloves and your favourite tools.

On a more disturbing note: there has been some vandalism at Fleming Park. Three of the benches that were installed after the flood have been torn from their moorings. This was no small feat as there are three-foot stakes holding the benches in place and there has been some damage in the process. Also a shrub was dug up and removed from one of the beds. The benches will be repaired and reinstalled. The shrub will be replaced, perhaps with a barberry or other thorny shrub.





Dealing with Weeds without Chemicals

Avoid disturbing the soil – millions of weed seeds resided in the soil. Every time the soil is disturbed, more seeds are brought to the surface which now have the light and heat they need to germinate.

Apply mulch – Maintain a layer of organic material to keep the light from the seeds. This also moderates the temperature of the soil and reduces moisture loss.

More plants means that there are fewer opportunities for weeds to take hold.

Weed after watering when they are easier to remove.

Remove weeds when they are small. There will be less disturbance of the soil

Remove flowers and seed heads before the seeds disperse.

Weeds that have not gone to seed can be put straight into the home composter. If there are weed seeds present send them to the city compost.

This Month in the Garden – Peterborough & Area Master Gardeners May

- Harden off seedlings.
- Treat for slugs, aphids, and blackspot if necessary.
- Deadhead tulips and daffodils, leaving the foliage to nourish the bulb and to die back naturally.
- Take notes and photos of bulb plantings for later changes.
- Plant tender summer-flowering bulbs (glads, cannas, callas and dahlias).
- Check trees for tent caterpillars and other insects.
- Stake and tie trees, shrubs and vines as required.
- Cage peonies.
