An earlier career in advertising together with a degree in biology and several years of photography at The Ontario College of Art were a perfect preparation for the mail order nursery business. They have customers from coast to coast; pioneering a new shipping method for our potted plants. Gardenimport's biennial catalogues are lavishly illustrated and were among the first full colour garden catalogues. They also have a great website and have done

Tips for preparing your entries: Remember, grooming is important. Remove spent blooms and dead/dying foliage. Clean soil and pot. Remove bugs. Clean vegetables but do not scrub. Look carefully at the criteria for the class. Entries can be disqualified if they don't conform to the rules.

Mystery Tour

On Sunday July 22nd, a wonderful sunny day, 41 adventurous folks headed out on a mystery tour. The first garden we visited was that of Judy Harris near Cobourg. It sure was the wow factor of the day! Judy and her husband have a large acreage with some very unusual trees and plants and even a putting green. The pond was a real eve catcher, frogs and all. In Cobourg, we had the choice of different restaurants for lunch followed by a stroll on the main street to enjoy the municipal pots and window boxes filled with flowers. Yarn bombing, also known as yarnstorming, guerrilla knitting, urban knitting or graffiti knitting, is a type of street art that started in the Netherlands in 2004. It is non-permanent and easily removed, and does not harm the trees. The Scheming Skeiners of Colborne did this for their Apple Blossom Festival in May. We visited the Ecology Garden that



was developed by the Cramahe Horticultural Society they have worked hard on their lovely garden and it is a real butterfly magnet. These kind people even had the washroom facilities open for us. Then a visit to the sweet garden of Sandra Compton, which included her own artwork on easels as well as many interesting roses and a trumpet vine that requires continual trimming as it would cover everything. CELEBRATING THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE

To commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth, the Ontario Horticultural Association, through its Districts, will plant a Bur Oak in each of its 19 Districts. Oaks were chosen because at the time of King George VI's Coronation, acorns from the oaks in Windsor Great Park at Windsor Castle were shipped to Canada to be planted across the country. 'Coronation Oaks,' as they were called, still stand in Ontario. An oak seemed an ap-

propriate tree to commemorate the 60th anniversary of his daughter's Coronation. The Bur Oak was chosen because it has a wide range in Ontario. A draw to decide upon the planting location was made within District 4 and on September 26th at 2:00 p.m., everyone is invited to attend the planting ceremony at the Municipal Offices (corner of 123 East St. S. (Hwy. 36) and King Street) in Bobcaygeon.

106th O.H.A. CONVENTION 'Gardening Then and Now, 1812 – 2012'

Pat deVilliers, Karen Strano and Gary and Dianne West-lake represented Peterborough HS at the Ontario Horticultural Association 106th Annual Convention in Niagara-on-the-Lake where delegates from 278 Horticultural Societies from all over Ontario came together to learn, share ideas, reconnect with gardening friends and conduct the business of the OHA Annual General Meeting. Our District's Past-Director, John Sellers, was declared the President of the OHA Executive. Of special note for District 4: Bev. Silk, long time member of Grafton HS was presented with two awards at the Convention. She received the Award of Merit for her ongoing work within her society, at the district level (as secretary) and within her community. She also was recognized with the Youth Leader Award.

An invitation was extended from District 14 to attend the 107th Convention in Thunder Bay 'Up North and Down to Earth', which will be held July 19-21, 2013 at the Valhalla Inn in Thunder Bay.
