#### John Statham - "Perennial Grasses"

John Statham is the owner and operator of his own garden centre, 'John's Garden' in Uxbridge, Ontario. His garden centre is located at his home so his commute consists of grabbing a coffee and walking out the door! It is set in the middle of a pine forest, with shade plants under the pines and the sun plants in what used to be the paddocks. The old horse barn is used to house pots, bulbs and other various items.

John started up his own garden centre after working at Sheridan Nurseries for a few years. As his business continues to grow it's not unusual to have customers who have driven more than an hour to come see him. John's plant selection has increased substantially and now includes collections of Hostas (400 varieties), Daylilies (140 varieties) Heuchera, Ornamental Grasses (one of his loves), Echinacea, Peonies (especially Itoh peonies), Hydrangea, and Clematis (which has grown to over 100 varieties) and unusual Conifers.



In his spare time John writes a column for one his local papers, "Can You Dig It?"

The coolest plants that I have in my garden right now are a yellow lady's slipper, allium "Hair" (Google it!), and "Doll's Eyes" (Actaea Pachypoda)/White Baneberry that's apparently quite toxic so I'll try not to snack on it. The neat thing about gardening, though, is that MY cool plant is not the same as YOUR cool plant, and nor does it have to be.

I would encourage each of you to try some new plants this spring -- by buying new, trading with a friend or hitting a plant sale. LABEL your plant -- at future plant sales, we can always sell a named plant for more \$\$. It also helps you to work on your plant identification skills if you read labels while you're working around them.

There were 13 applicants this year so it was difficult to choose with our limited funds; however, 8 were chosen to be the lucky recipients. They are: Ennismore & District Horticultural Society, \$500 for planting 7 Japanese lilac trees to enhance the entrance to their recreational centre; Keith Wightman Public School, \$500 for planting a butterfly garden; Omemee and District Horticultural Society, \$500 for remodeling 2 existing village gardens; Peterborough

Green-Up (Ecology Park) \$250 for planting prehistoric plants in the children's garden; St. Alphonsus School \$500 for enhancing their ecosystem to attract butterflies; St. Peter's Secondary School (Section 23 Class) \$100 for berry bushes (haskap); Stewart Street Community Garden \$300 for berry bushes and fruit trees; Trent University – Sustainable Agriculture & Food Systems Society \$1,350 for perennials and fruit trees in their Trent Market garden.
