Carpooling Garden Trip - WEDNESDAY, JULY 15th

It's been quite a while since we have had any PHS Garden Trips. The cost of buses and the need to fill them, as well as the cost to you, discourage that kind of Garden Trip. However, inspired by the talk by John Statham on perennial grasses and all the slides of his grasses at the last PHS meeting, I spoke to him and we will be organizing a group of us to drive to Uxbridge to visit his gardens, about an hour's drive from Peterborough. "John's Garden" is set in the middle of a pine forest, with shade plants under the pines and the sun plants in what used to be the paddocks. The old horse barn is used to house pots, bulbs and other various items.

As well as the perennial grasses he featured in his talk, his plant selection has increased substantially and now includes collections of Hostas (400 varieties), Daylilies (140 varieties), Heuchera, Ornamental Grasses (one of his loves), Echinacea, Peonies (especially Itoh peonies), Hydrangea, and Clematis (which has grown to over 100 varieties) and unusual Conifers.

John will be available to give us a tour as well as opportunity to explore and shop on our own.

Lunch will be at the Tin Mill, a lovely little restaurant in Uxbridge.

Next stop will be Richters Herbs in nearby Goodwood, where we have



the option of a half hour talk as well as opportunities to tour the Greenhouses and gift shop for all things herbal, including plants, books, seeds, dried herbs and more. Then we head for home, probably with our trunks bulging with plants!

The Bee Cause calls for a ban on bee harmful pesticides and practices while proposing and delivering practical ways to help bees and wild pollinators.

Canadian garden retailers taking action:

Home Depot now requires its suppliers to label plants treated with neonicotinoids.

Art Knapp Plantland has told its suppliers they will no longer accept nursery plants treated with neonicotinoids.

Lowes is phasing out the sale of products that contain neonic pesticides by 2019.

Rona is encouraging its plant suppliers to reduce the use of neonicotinoids and will begin labelling plants in 2016.

Sheridan has asked its plant suppliers to confirm if their plants are Neonicotinoid free, and has confirmed that all plants grown by Sheridan are neonic-free.
