FLOWER SHOW - MAY 24, 2023

THE SCHEDULE:

Must be in place with completed entry cards at 6:45 pm. Judging begins at 7:00 pm.

<u>Prize money</u>: 1st place - \$3.00, 2nd place - \$2.00, 3rd place - \$1.00 (to be presented night of show).

Best in Show - Prize \$5.00.

Judge's Choice - Prize \$5.00. First time exhibitors are not limited to Class "1" only.

SECTION A: SPECIMEN (Cut Flower)

CLASS A

- 1 For 1st time exhibitors "Bring your best bloom", one stem
- 2 Ferns 3 stems
- 3 Heuchera 3 leaves, 2 or 3 cultivars
- 4 Pansies 3 blooms
- 5 Iris 1 spike, any type or colour
- 6 Tulip single, 1 bloom, any cultivar
- 7 Tulip double, 1 bloom, any cultivar
- 8 Bulb collection 3 stems, 2 or 3 cultivars
- 9 Spring Flower Collection 3 perennial, 2 bulb
- 10 Hosta 3 small leaves, same cultivar
- 11 Hosta 3 medium leaves, same cultivar
- 12 Hosta 3 large leaves, same cultivar
- 13 Allium 1 stem
- 14 Columbine 1 stem
- 15 Bleeding Heart 1 stem
- 16 Solomon's Seal 1 stem
- 17 Any other Spring flowering branch NAMED, max. length 30"
- 18 Any other Spring bulb, corm or rhizome one bloom or stem, NAMED, multiple entries will be allowed provided they are different cultivars.
- 19 Any other perennial NAMED, multiple entries will be allowed provided they are different cultivars.

SECTION B: DESIGN

- 20 "For the 1st time exhibitors" "Heralding Spring" design to include Spring Flowers any size in container
- 21 "Heralding Spring" design to include Spring Flowers any size in container
- 22 "Shades of Pink & Purple" in your Favorite Wine Glass
- 23 "A Mini Design" 5in. x 5in. (not to exceed)





FLOWER SHOW - MAY 24, 2023

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR FLOWER SHOWS

- 1. Exhibitors shall be a member in good standing, of the Peterborough Horticultural Society
- 2. Horticultural Exhibitors must be amateurs. Design Exhibitors must be amateur. An amateur is a person who does not earn his/her livelihood from the growth and/or sale of flowers, vegetables, plants or fruits. Exhibitors must be present to place entries onto the show tables.
- 3. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each section in each class unless specified.
- 4. All exhibits must be in place by the specified time.
- 5. The exhibitor must grow their own entries in the horticultural (specimen) classes. In the design classes, the exhibitor may purchase the materials.
- 6. Exhibitors must furnish their own clean, clear, glass containers and the exhibits must be removed after the show. The Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage to the containers.
- 7. Each entry must be accompanied by a completed entry tag. Name the cultivar where possible. Entry tags will be available from the Show Committee prior to each show.
- 8. Judges will use the publication "Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards" (Publication #34) for all guidelines and rules. Copy can be found in PHS Library.
- 9. The decision of the judge is final. Judges may withhold an award if in their opinion the exhibit is not worthy.

Design

- 1. In Design Classes, accessories may be used. (Unless otherwise stated)
- 2. In Design Classes, material must be fresh (not dry, silk, etc.). (Unless otherwise stated).

Horticulture

- 1. Artificial materials are not permitted.
- 2. Unless otherwise stated, buds showing colour are counted as blooms.
- 3. A Class may be subdivided and/or a new Class may be created at the discretion of the Flower Show Committee.

Photography

- 1. Photos must have been taken by the exhibitor within the past 24 months.
- 2. Entries are limited to one per exhibitor in each class.
- 3. Prints must be in colour unless otherwise specified.
- 4. Prints must not exceed 4" X 6" (10cm X15 cm). No frames allowed.
- 5. Each print must be accompanied by a fully completed entry tag.
- 6. Entries must be picked up at the end of the meeting.
- 7. Entries must not have been previous winners at a PHS show.
- 8. Entries may only be submitted once.


RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR FLOWER SHOWS - CONTINUED

Exhibitors Information

- Clearly print your complete name (first and last) on entry tags
- Oasis should NOT be seen. Try not to take a flower out and then replace it. The block will break if full of holes.
- Gladioli and Iris display best in narrow necked containers.
- Study the categories carefully. Make sure your exhibit is placed in the proper category.
- Submit your entry on time.
- In specimen classes, judges look for uniformity in size, colour and perfection. Try to avoid mismatches in size and colours.
- Check all foliage and remove blemished or damaged leaves. Faded or black petals should be removed.

CONDITIONING TIPS FOR FLOWER SHOWS

- 1. Use only very clean vases, pail and clippers. Rinse pails, knives and clippers periodically with mild chlorine bleach solution.
- 2. Cut flowers in the cool of the day, either early morning or late evening. Immerse stems immediately after cutting in a pail of tepid water.
- 3. Remove unnecessary foliage, including any leaves that will be submerged when arranged.
- 4. Recut stems on the diagonal, removing 1 inch, preferably under water.
- 5. Plunge stems into deep water. Leave for several hours or overnight in a cool draught free area.
- 6. A commercial florist preservative may be added to the water, but if used in the water for conditioning, it must also be used in the water for arranging.
- 7. To condition ferns, break off rather than cut stems and completely submerge in cool water for 12 hours before arranging.
- 8. Iris can be conditioned in 3 drops of peppermint in a quart of water and arranged in shallow water.





OSHAWA BUS TRIP - WED, JUNE 14TH - 8:30 AM TO 5:00 PM

Our trip arrangements are now finalized for a Bus Trip to Oshawa on Wednesday, June 14th. We will meet at the former Canadian Canoe Museum at Monaghan Rd near Lansdowne St where we have permission to leave our cars for the day. The bus will leave at 8:30 am.

Our first stop will be the Oshawa Valley Botanical Gardens to visit the peonies. The OVBG is a diverse garden complex known for its seasonal display of peonies with waterfalls and walking paths. Next, we drive to the Parkwood Estate, a 55-room mansion built in 1917 - 1919 by R. S. McLaughlin, founder of General Motors Canada.

At 11 am we have a 90-minute tour of the historic gardens with our group being divided roughly into groups of 10. The gardens were designed in the 1920s reminiscent of the great gardens of England. The design is Arts and Crafts lawns, pavilions, statues and walkways. A 2-acre 'arte moderne' formal garden was created in 1935. 26 grounds keepers maintain the gardens.

Lunch at 1 pm will be at Bistro 67, Durham College, a farm-to-table teaching facility with its own gardens. Lunch is included in the cost of the trip. After lunch we will be visiting 2 private gardens. The first one, only 10 minutes from the College, is a city property with a garden train and many garden rooms and was established just 7 years ago.

Our 2nd garden contains a peony garden, a pond, unusual trees, a bridge and creek and has many seating areas, a verandah and gazebo. From there, we head back to Peterborough and should arrive about 5 pm. As we will not be visiting any garden centres, bins will not be required this trip.

The total cost of the trip including tours and lunch is \$90.


