#### SEAN JAMES "FUSION GARDENING"

Sean James has been gardening professionally since age sixteen. He owns and operates 'Sean James Consulting & Design'.

Named by Landscape Ontario as 2020 and 2021's Garden Communicator of the Year, gardening has been Sean James' passion and profession for almost 40 years. A graduate of Niagara Parks School of Horticulture, a Master Gardener, writer, and teacher, Sean focuses on eco-gardening techniques. Sean had the honour of being part of creating the new Ontario Landscape Tree Planting Guide, the Grow-Me-Instead guide, the Ontario Horticultural Apprenticeship Curriculum, the national Red Seal Occupational Standard, and the Master Gardeners Reference Manual.

Sean will be speaking to us about "Fusion Gardening". Encouraged by many municipalities and regions, Fusion Gardening® blends LID (rainwater handling) with xeriscaping (drought-tolerant gardening) and enfolds plantings to enhance biodiversity. One of the main foci of this style is to engage the public with beauty. Since it's so important that property owners take up this gauntlet, we'll address the backbone of each of these disciplines, and discuss how to do each artfully. With climate change, storms are becoming stronger and less predictable. Droughts are getting longer. Many of us seek to use our gardens to do 'Good' for biodiversity. Fusion Gardening™ does all these things by minimizing water use, keeping the water that falls on our property ON our property, and, through the favouring of native and wildlife-supporting plant choices, support the life that visits our yards.

## THE USE OF COFFEE GROUNDS WITH PLANTS

So many of us throw out our used coffee grounds, but did you know they can be used with gardens and houseplants. Coffee is rich in Nitrogen, Potassium and Phosphorus therefore containing many essential ingredients for plant survival. Coffee grounds can be raked into the substrate or be added to your outside composter, including vermi-compost (worms). Coffee will increase soil porosity and lower pH levels. The roots of some acid-sensitive plants like lavender, tomatoes, and rosemary may not tolerate exposure to coffee.

In soils that are already rich on Nitrogen, the added nitrogen may stunt the growth of plants, so best used in poor soils. Some people say it can repel cats, kills slugs and keeps weeds at bay. It also beckons earthworms, thus breaking down the soils even more.

Roses, azaleas, lilies, blueberries, and gooseberries are acidloving plants. Your coffee grounds can be added to houseplants as well, and the added source of nitrogen will be great for plants such as African Violet and Cyclamen.

Adding a cup of coffee grounds to your outside composter once a week, which encourages the earthworms will breakdown the compost even faster !!! So just enjoy your morning coffee everyone before you head out to your gardens for the day.

## **CLOVER LOVER**

For the last 3 years I have been seeding my lawn with White Dutch Clover and my lawn is now a healthy mix of approximately 50% clover and 50% grass. I love the look and my lawn is much easier to maintain. White Clover (Trifolium repens) is a legume, the same family as peas and beans. This means that it fixes atmospheric nitrogen to fertilize itself. Clover's nitrogen-fixing capabilities allow it to tolerate poor soil conditions better than grasses and, it can fertilize other plants. It is also cold tolerant, can stand the odd heatwave and spreads once established (this can make it tough to keep out of garden beds).

White Dutch Clover has the following advantages:

- It is green with a white flower and looks great, it greens up in spring before the grass does!
- It self-fertilizes by fixing nitrogen which also benefits the turf grass or other plants around it.
- Because it is drought tolerant it requires less watering and since it is a small plant, less mowing.
- Its tough roots break up compact soil, self aerating, but holding the soil together to reduce erosion.
- It helps reduce weeds (dense growth prevents weeds from thriving).
- Attracts pollinators and beneficial insects that help control pests.
- It's cheap and easy to sow I've spent about \$40.00 on seed over the last 3 years and have a big lawn.

There are a few disadvantages as well:

- It is not as tolerant to foot traffic but does quite well when mixed with turf grasses.
- It attracts bees a problem if you are allergic.
- It is susceptible to some diseases and pests, but this is usually controlled by mowing to 3-4 inches.
- It is an aggressive grower which can be a problem around garden beds.
- Some people think it looks 'messy' on a lawn, I in fact love the look.

I simply hand sew the clover wherever I have a grassy area and only use about a pound a year. I've been very pleased with the difference Clover has made to my lawn, the next step it to get a pair of hungry goats to keep it under control.

NOTE: Finding a 4-leaf clover is really lucky as there is only one occurrence in about 10,000 clover plants.

Here is how my clover lawn looks at the end of April – it will continue to green and fill in over the next few weeks.



## Why #NoMowMay May Not be Great for your Lawn

While the #nomowmay movement has good intentions of reducing carbon emissions from lawn mowers, it may not be the best thing to do for your lawn in our region. Letting your lawn grow too long can lead to increased pest activity (like ticks) and the growth of weeds, which can weaken the overall health of your lawn. With the amount of rainfall that we usually get this month, I think you'd have a lot of trouble finally mowing it once June 1st arrives.

#NoMowMay was created in the UK to assist with pollinators by providing early food for them in the form of dandelions. While dandelions are often viewed as a beneficial food source for bees and other pollinators, they are not actually the best choice. Dandelions have a low nutritional value and can cause digestive issues for some pollinators, such as butterflies and moths. When dandelions are allowed to take over a lawn, they can outcompete other plants that may provide more diverse and nutritious food sources for pollinators.

Therefore, it's important to strike a balance between promoting pollinator-friendliness and maintaining a healthy lawn. This can be achieved by incorporating pollinator-friendly and native flowers into your lawn or garden, and by regularly mowing your lawn to a healthy length. By taking these steps, you can create a safe and healthy outdoor space for yourself and for the pollinators that help keep our ecosystems thriving.

- 10 Hosta 3 small leaves, same cultivar

- 13 Allium 1 stem

- 15 Bleeding Heart 1 stem
- 16 Solomon's Seal 1 stem
- 17 Any other Spring flowering branch NAMED, max. length 30"
- 18 Any other Spring bulb, corm or rhizome one bloom or stem, NAMED, multiple entries will be allowed provided they are different cultivars.
- 19 Any other perennial NAMED, multiple entries will be allowed provided they are different cultivars.
