Wednesday November 22 @ 7pm, Lions Centre: Ethan Benson, Elevated Arboriculture, "Common Tree Problems"

PHS Member Ethan Benson is an ISA certified arborist, and a planting agent for the Forest's Ontario's 50 Million Tree Program. In addition to owning and operating a local tree-care company, he also teaches tree health sciences within the Arboriculture and Urban Forestry Programs at Sir Sandford Fleming College. Ethan will be discussing:

- The value of a tree
- Common concerns and the diagnostic process
- Soil Characteristics and related root disorders
- Structural concerns and the role of pruning
 - Included unions
 - Compartmentalization of disease in trees (CODIT)
 - Topping and Tipping

Summary of Gary Westlake's talk from our October Meeting

For those who were unable to attend our October meeting, Gary Westlake, PHS member and Ptbo MG, spoke to us about soil. Members received our email message with the link so they can listen to Gary's talk until the next general meeting.

Last month's speaker stated, "start with good soil and a good layer of mulch (2-3 inches)": what an excellent segue for this month's topic... "What Plants Eat: Soil"

Highlights from Gary's talk:

Plants and animals co-existed long before we walked on the earth, then along we came working the land/soil to grow fields of various cash crops: corn, wheat, soy etc... creating a monoculture.

In the 19th Century a chemist named Justus von Liebig expanded traditional thinking by explaining the importance of nutrients for plants. Plants need nutrients to survive: N(nitrogen) P(Phosphorus) K(Potassium). Plants receive N-P-K from the soil with the help of micro-organisms such as bacteria and fungi, they break down the nutrients and transports them into the plants root system. Bacteria forms two functions, fixing the nitrogen and removing the phosphorous from the soil.

Things to remember:

- High levels of oxygen impede bacteria from performing their functions.
- Adding chemical fertilizers to the soil kills bacteria, when the bacteria is reduced or eliminated plants are desperately trying to survive.
- Nitrogen fixing and phosphorous-solubilizing (removing (P) from the soil) are compromised when chemical fertilizers are added and oxygen levels are high.

Gabe Brown (rancher in the Mid-West USA) principles of regeneration of our land:

- No till, soil benefits from not being disturbed (chemically or mechanically), it also reduces weed seeds from being turned up to the surface
- Mulch, armour the soil to reduce dehydration thus maintaining nutrients
- Cover-crops, have living matter on the soil throughout the year, soil recovers by building diversity
- Animal-plant alliances, manage the herd in pens, ensuring the vegetation is not depleted, therefore both co-existing
- Rhizophagy the process of bacteria surrounding roots and transporting nutrients into plant cells. Bacteria is then released back into the soil and the process repeats.
- Seeds are covered with bacteria that pass microbes to the next plant. Do not sterilize seeds, this removes the bacteria and microbes.

Conclusion:

- Plants do not need humans to thrive
- Plants ranch soil bacteria for their nutrients and other substance that the plants need
- Bacteria require low oxygen to function
- Chemical fertilizers inhibit bacteria
- Animal fertilizers are good
- Plants can fix nitrogen even in their leaves
- Add (natural fertilizers, organic matter) to the surface of the soil, do not dig it in. Leave it there for the bacteria and micro-organisms to work it in.
