Join us in welcoming Ryan Vieira from Our Little Worm Farm to our stage on June 26th. Ryan will be speaking to us about vermicomposting, what it is, how to do it, and the benefits it produces.

Our Little Worm Farm is a small family-run worm farm located in Trent Lakes, just outside of Bobcaygeon. They raise red wiggler composting worms and design, test and manufacture their own worm bins and bokashi composting bin systems, all of which are available for purchase on their website.



Ryan became interested in composting and natural fertilizers when he started his red wiggler farm in 2019. Ryan has spoken about the benefits of vermicomposting at the Fenelon Falls Horticultural Society, the Oakville Horticultural Society and the Thorold Horticulture Society.

Ryan will have red wigglers available for sale following his presentation for \$10 per cup.

Interesting Life Span of Mourning Cloak Butterflies

Mourning cloak butterflies have one of the longest life spans for a native butterfly in North America and Eurasia- up to 10-12 months! They overwinter by hibernating under loose bark and other tree cracks and cavities. Their body temperature drops to the temperature around them and enters a state of Torpor. They can withstand temperatures as cold as minus 10 degrees or less Fahrenheit when tucked into a sheltered crevice. They will be one of the first butterflies to emerge from the trees in the forest once we have a sunny Spring Day.



As soon as they wake-up they start to mate and lay eggs, staying together in large groups to appear larger to deter predators. As soon as the larvae(-caterpillars) hatch they will begin to feed on the hosts leaves as well as any unhatched eggs and pupate to become a butterfly. Since they emerge so early there are not many flowers and nectar to feed on, so they get nutrients from mud, dung, tree sap, and rotting fruit left on the trees over the winter.

Their dark burgundy colour, blue dots and yellow edging on the top of their wings is quite distinct but when they close their wings and land against the bark of the tree they are well camouflaged with dark brown/black and gray markings. They fly in groups so you can

often spot them on a sunny day in early Spring flying around sunny patches of mud on the trails through the woods. If they are on a branch and you knock against them, they will sometimes 'play dead', and fold their wings and fall to the ground and just lie there for several minutes! If they fall into a pile of leaves it is hard to see them.

The females can have 2 to 3 broods in the early spring and summer. By mid to late summer these new butterflies will go into a light dormant state until fall and then wake to eat as much as they can to prepare for the winter hibernation. They will be the ones to emerge next year, on a warm, sunny Spring Day to start the cycle again!
